

REVIEW REFEREE'S DECISION (11-3-1) / PROTEST PROCEDURE

If a coach feels that there has been a misinterpretation or misapplication of a rule or penalty, not including judgment, the coach may request and be granted a time-out, provided the request is made during the dead ball immediately following the situation in which the possible incorrect decision occurred. When a time-out is so granted, the second referee shall escort the coach across the court to the first referee's platform. All players shall remain on the court during the review. There will be no libero exchange during the review. Players may be brought water and must take care not to spill water to create a delay when it is time to resume play.

**If the referees' decision is upheld, the coach will then be charged a time out and play will resume immediately. If the referees' decision is reversed, the coach will not be charged a time out. The second referee will notify the scorer of the decision and ask that the scoresheet be changed accordingly. The scorer will use a

 to correct the scoresheet.**

If the coach chooses to file a protest, the scorer will quickly note the following on the reverse of the scoresheet, or in the Remarks section of the scoresheet:

- **Score at the time of the protest**
- **Players on the court and their positions at the time of the protest**
- **Team substitutions made before the protested situation**
- **Team timeouts charged before the protested situation**
- **A brief synopsis of the situation that caused the protest, including which rule was violated or omitted or which penalty was improperly assessed.**
- **Signatures from the scorer, one coach from each team and the second referee indicate that the facts have been recorded correctly.**

Directly after the match, the first referee will contact the assignor to relay what happened.

The school has 24 hours to file a protest regardless of what happens during the match.
